# **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

## 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college offers 3 UG and 3 PG programmes along with carrier-oriented course in Functional English and Few diplomas and value-added courses. In this Session, University permitted us to start 03 Ph.D. centers in commerce, Music and History respectively. Out of twenty-two highly qualified Teachers, sixteen are holding Ph.D. degree and two have submitted their research thesis. In average, Teachers are having 25-30 years or rich teaching experience. The curriculum has been restricted by parent University. Our Faculty members of Home Science, Indian Music, Sanskrit and Rural Handicraft have been working on Board of studies of University and contributing to curriculum restructuring from last ten years. To ensure, effective curriculum delivery our college adopted the following process. Supervision Committee is formed to observe and supervise the taught curriculum. College provides an opportunity to every Faculty member and encourage them to attend skill development trainings like Orientation, Refresher Courses, Conferences, Seminars and Workshops. The academic extension activities are also conducted to create and nature a scientific temper amongst students. To promote use of ICT in every field of education, the college has provided computers, projectors and the related software library computerization and use of ICT and media facility in teaching learning process have also been provided. The college library has e-journal facility for all stake holders. A part from lectures we too adopt innovative teaching methods using e-learning resources. Use of student's centric activities like seminar survey, project works and visit of social organization are carried out to help the students according to their need, Seminars are presented using PPT by the department of Human Development, Communication Extension, Home Economics, Environmental studies and Microbiology. Subject wise study association develops awareness and scientific temper through organizing number at activities. Advanced learners are motivated to participate in academic competitions, organized by subject associations. Experts are invited to make topic more interesting. Political Science department makes the question Bank for the Students. Unit wise test and session end exams are conducted after completion of unit and syllabus. For slow learners, special coaching and practice sessions, improvement test are arranged to strengthen the understanding and concepts. The college organizes State & National level Conferences and Workshops regularly for keeping pace with recent development. Syllabus of each subject is downloaded from University websites at the beginning of the session. Teachers prepare semester wise teaching plan for subjects individually. All the faculty members maintained their academic diary which is further checked by HoD's and Principal once in a week. Feedback on syllabus has been collected from students, teaching staff, alumni, parents. The suggestion regarding the syllabus changes have been communicated to the University bodies through BOS members at the college. IQAC monitors syllabus completion, collect biometric attendance of teachers and give reports to principal. The effectiveness in the curriculum planning implementation is thoroughly assessed by the Principal, along with IQAC and Supervision Committee and the process is discussed with all Stake holders and corrective measures are implemented with the goal of achieving global competency at local level.

Feedback Obtained

Our Feedback Mechanism is divided into five categories Viz, Students, Parents, Alumni, Teachers and Employers. Feedback Questionnaire is prepared by the college IQAC and taken manually. Student Feedback is based on two criterions, Overall college functioning and teaching learning process. Questions are asked on the learning environment, Canteen Facility, Functioning of anti-ragging cell, sport facility, infrastructural Facilities, library, assessment and evaluation process, Modern teaching aids, etc. The strength and weakness mentioned by the students are summarized. Departmental meeting is conducted to discuss and chalk out programmes based on the students Feedback. Again, student satisfaction survey based on questionnaire is also a symbolic representation of student's general opinion again, on every 15th Aug. in annual meetings of students we receive students oral Feedback on basic requirements, Library matters, timetable clash etc. Parents give Feedback on Facilities required in the institution and voice their words concerns. Parents want to increase implement placement opportunities through syllabus. We used to organize PTA Meet of all Faculties together. But, now are planning to conduct it faculty wise. Suggestions given by the guardians are taken into account for future development. Again, we have registered alumni association, whose feedback is

based on college role in the development of Students' personality and employability. Teachers give feedback on course content and suggest inclusion of recent developments in the subject-These suggestions are forwarded to the B.O.S. Members of different Subjects. We are also taking feedback on the curriculum and on current educational Scenario from employers. Value based courses are designed on their feedback. College placement cell also takes cognizance of this feedback while organizing training sessions. Again, their Feedback highlights evaluation parameters concerning subject knowledge, behavior, punctuality of students, etc. Timely corrective actions are taken on the feedback given by students. Introductory sessions, Fresher's Party and Induction programmes were organized for first year students. The college is planning to introduce online Feedback system from the new session.

Considering the students at the center, as a soul of education institute, IQAC of our college has prepared guidelines for Mentoring system to be implemented by the teachers. Every year, mentoring system is implemented as per the guidelines provided by IQAC based on the following objectives – Objectives: ? To

establish intimate contact between students and teachers. ? To identify advance and slow learners- ? To find out solutions on academic and also personal problems of students. ? To prepare students for academic excellence. ? To convey the benefits of regular attendance and ultimately to decrease drop-out rate of students. After the completion of admission procedure, from the beginning of the session Mentoring system in implemented in the college. Mentoring system convener provides guidelines with the list of allotted mentees to the mentor teachers. Mentors keep the record of tests, mob. No., Email – id, academic performance of the mentors. On 15th August, every year, in the General Meeting of the students, Mentoring Scheme is explained to the students. Mentors also explain 'Vatsalya Vidya-Nidhi' a fund raised by the college staff to help financially weaker students, that helps the students in the forms of uniforms, text books, tuition fees, bus passes etc. Mentors also find out advance and slowly learns to guide them as per their abilities. Programme and Course objectives also have been elaborately explained through Mentoring system. Objectives of Mentoring System of 2018 – 19 ? Intimate relations have been observed between teachers and students. ? NSS Volunteer of B.A. III had been selected for R.D. Parade at

Delhi (26 Jan, 2019) who represented Sant Gadgebaba Amravati University, Amravati. ? Our advance learners brought laurels in the University exams of 2018-19. Five students from the faculties of Arts and Commerce at UG and PG levels ranked in the Merit List of University. Two students obtained Gold Medals in the subject of Sanskrit Literature and English Literature at UG level and one student obtained Gold Medal in Sanskrit at P.G. ? 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### 2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

As the college is affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University College follows reforms implemented by the university. For the faculty of Home-Science semester pattern Examinations have been implemented from academic session 2010-11 in which odd semesters have been conducted along with valuation and declaration of results at college level. The faculty follows pattern of theory, practical, internal assessment Arts and commerce by university. For faculties of Arts and Commerce, 3rd and 4th Semester pattern had been implemented in the session 2018-19. These faculties also followed prescribed syllabus and exam pattern. Reforms in syllabus and exams had been conveyed to HoD's in IQAC meeting. Mid-Summer Examination, Class tests had been conducted as per the schedule of university. In the faculties of Arts and Commerce unit test had been conducted with flexibility and convenience at class levels. Subject teachers discussed paper solutions and corrected the mistakes of the student's university exam questions papers were also given to the students for practice. Advance learners were also benefited by the special guidance. For students of Arts and Commerce at UG PG ranked in the merit list of university Exams 2018-19. Three also obtained Gold medals as the subject toppers in the university. Question Bank, Subject albums, Files of paper cuttings, ICT enhanced learning experiences of slow as well as advance learners. Grievance cell of university also provide photocopies of answer papers to the students. Qualified and experienced teaching staff, proper implementation of exam related matters make evaluation method effective.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The IQAC of the college prepared Academic Calendar for the Session 2018-19 as usual. It was followed for the conduct of Examination, Continuous internal evaluation and related matters. Keeping the 'motto', 'vision and Mission' in the mind. IQAC prepared Academic Calendar for the session 2018-19. Head of the Departments also prepared their teaching plans, Schedule of unit test and departmental activities. College Academic Calendar consists of Admission Procedure, teaching days, Preparations of winter exam, University Exams, First Semester Vacation, Nonacademic days, Second Semester teaching days, Preparation of Summer Exams, University Exams etc. The calendar also consists of public Holidays, Birth Death Anniversaries of great leaders, celebration of Annual Gathering, Alumni Meet, Parents Meet, Farewell to final year students. For continuous Internal Evaluation Unit test, common test had been conducted by the faculties of the college. Faculty of Home Science conducted odd semesters, valuation and prepared results as per the guidelines of university. Separate Examination committees were formed for each faculty. Faculties of Arts and Commerce conducted unit tests of their subjects as per the convenience in the periods of the subjects. The Examination Committee prepared time table of tests and exams at least a week before the exams. Students council programmes, NSS, NCC activities had been conducted throughout the session that helped to find out the skills and abilities of the students by the conveners of the committees. The college followed SGB University Academic Calendar with flexibility as per the need of the time.

Keeping this motto in our mind, we confirmed this project more efficiently in the session 2018-19 for marketing purpose. We have given exposure by installing our product stalls. On 26 Sept. 2018, we arranged stall at. Smt. V.N. Mahila Mahavidyalaya, on 3 Jan. 2019 in Shriram Aasegaonkar School Pusad and on 26 Jan. 2019 again in Smt. V.N. Mahila Mahavidyalaya, Pusad. ECO friendly files, conference kits, and different types of shopping and travelling bags are available with us for sell. The project in charge prof. U.P. Tikhe herself is providing fund to develop this project for its prosperity. Best Practice 02 Title - Diet, Health, Hygiene Awareness among pregnant and Lactating women of low social economicstatus in slum area, and in adopted village (Dattakgram) Dhansal Tq. Pusad Dist. Yavatmal. Objectives: • To create diet health and hygiene awareness among pregnant and lactating women. • To convey the importance of nutritious diet and hygiene to the women. • To bring out the seriousness of low-calorie diet and unhygienic surrounding. Context: Attainment to women empowerment is the vison and mission of our college. We have achieved some success in gaining women empowerment. We continued this best practice in the session 2018-19 and will continue in future, because our aim is giving the benefit of this practice to the grass root women. She faces numerous challenges and problems due to their illiteracy, poverty and superstitions. Taking such women into consideration the practice has been implemented to bring the fundamental change in the mindset of women. The student made the survey and selected slum areas and Dattakgram Dhansal for the implementation of the practice.
